Living Green

By the end of this year, 100% of the electricity that WSFSSH pays for in its buildings will come from renewable wind power. We made this change and saved approximately \$70,000 (reducing our electric cost by over 15%). Saving money and save

We are now composting at the Senior Center and at all of our buildings that prepare communal meals. The compost is nourishing our own gardens, and at Fleming, compost is also being shared with 22nd Street neighbors.

Energy efficient boilers, new windows, and a series of other upgrades are being installed in most of our older buildings.

Work at Borinquen



The building was in poor condition when WSFSSH bought it in 2011. Since that time, we've been working hard.

Two feet of soil from the entire property was removed and replaced with 2 feet of certified clean soil. Repointing bricks and exterior work is almost completed. Complete renovation of the existing apartments began this December and is anticipated to be completed by June, 2013. Residents have approved the model "relocation" apartment and will be temporarily relocated throughout the building while their apartments are renovated.

Assistant Manager Hugo Meneses said, ""It is a wonderful experience to feel the confidence of a community that allows you to remodel the building, but also builds community within the community."

Westbourne Renovation

The Westbourne is undergoing significant renovation. Building systems have been upgraded,

including a new boiler, fire system, lighting and ventilation. A floor by floor renovation of all suites is in progress, the 7th — 3rd floors are completed, with resident suites on the 2nd and 1st floors in progress. The office and common spaces on the lst

Emergency Housing

WSFSSH, together with the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, the Church of the Ascension, the Neighborhood Coalition for Shelter and the NYC Department of Homeless Services, provided temporary shelter to 24 men who took refuge on the steps of West Side religious institutions and public spaces during the winter months.

Sixteen of the men moved into our Valley Lodge Transitional Shelter, eight have since moved into permanent housing. The others continue at Valley Lodge receiving comprehensive services preparing them for permanent housing. In addition to the collaborative efforts of our partners, the success of this program continues to be the diligent efforts of the Valley Lodge staff.

Funding for the program was given by the Fifth Avenue Church and the New York Community Trust. We are preparing to launch the program again this winter so that we may assist another group of men seeking safe haven during the cold, working with them to find permanent homes.
